

## **From Bishop Mark**

The following is part of a sermon I preached at the final service of the F5 ministry unit in Goulburn (for those interested the middle section looked at Genesis 12:1-9 and Mark 4:26-41). Over the past 11-years, F5 and its associated ministries were used by God to bring healing to weary saints and new life to curious seekers. Please pray for those who were part of its journey as they fellowship elsewhere.

When we were living in the North of England I'd walk our boys home each day within sight of the famous Durham Cathedral. Perched above a curve in the River Wear it is one of the great sights of Christendom, "half church of God, half castle against the Scots" as Sir Walter Scott wrote.


Like Rome the Cathedral wasn't built in a day. Indeed it wasn't built in a year. Or even a decade. Or even a century. Commenced in 1093, it did not reach its final form until almost 400 years later, in 1490.

I sometimes imagine what it must have felt like to be a stonemason working on the Cathedral around the middle of that period. To come to the end of your career, your life even, with the task still unfinished. Would there have been a sense of despair and disappointment about what you haven't achieved? Or would there have been a sense of hope that comes from knowing that you have been caught up in a grand project that incorporates your labour and the labour of others while being bigger than both?

When it comes to grand projects there is none grander than that launched by Jesus around 2000 years ago: "I will build my church." I will build my church – not a physical structure but the family of people from every tribe language and tongue who call on Jesus as Lord and Saviour.

We gather today because we have all in different ways invested our time our energy and our gifts in that project. And yet we live with the sense that the project remains incomplete, the building as it were is not yet at lock-up stage. That is particularly the case on an occasion like today, when we mark the end of one particular expression of church.

Let's think again about our imaginary stonemason working on Durham Cathedral. Although he may not have seen the building completed his work was absolutely vital. If he hadn't cut each block so it would sit perfectly on the one beneath it the whole structure would have crashed to the ground and generations to come would have been deprived of its beauty.

# **Ngukurr Mission Exposure Trip**

## How can our church better support the missionaries we send?

That's the question that got the conversation started in 2022 with Lee and Ruth Walton.

The Waltons are located in Howard Springs, just outside of Darwin, Northern Territory. St Matthew's Wanniassa prays for and financially supports Lee as the Property Manager for the Anglican Diocese of the Northern Territory, and Ruth as the Anglican Dean at Nungalinya College, Darwin. (Nungalinya is the Combined Churches Training College for Indigenous Australians.)

How could we better connect with and understand the nature of the Walton's life and ministry? And begin to connect with and understand something of the Aboriginal Christian Church they serve? Lee proposed a work party from St Matthew's, Wanniassa, to assist with renovations on the church building of St Matthew's, Ngukurr. This also seemed like a good proposal in light of our local building program. Serving the church in Ngukurr would remind us that Christ's mission must turn us outward to others, to Australia and to the world.







St Matthew's, Ngukurr, (pictured) is part of a significant work of God started in 1908. Three Aboriginal missionaries and three Anglo missionaries arrived in the Roper River area to establish a safe haven for Indigenous people being slaughtered by representatives of the British and Africa Meat Company.

The missionaries arrived to protect human life, and to begin preaching eternal life in Jesus Christ. The Community of Ngukurr, and the Christian church, is testimony to God enabling both. Indigenous Christian leadership has and continues to characterise the church of St Matthew's, Ngukurr, now led by Ngukurr locals William and Marjorie Hall.



Please pray for the Lord to keep raising up people there to follow Christ, and lead His church.

Our work party comprised seven (7) men from St Matthew's, Wanniassa. The Flight Crew departed Canberra on Friday 9 June, while the Road Crew left around a week earlier. Meeting up in Katherine, NT, we arrived together in Ngukurr (630km SE of Darwin) on Sunday 11 June.

The following six days we worked under the direction of Dave Unwin, a Darwin-based builder. Our tasks were to remove and replace the external cladding, repair and paint ceiling and walls to the main room, and two side rooms, repair and reseal the main doors, as well as upgrade external safety lighting.



We were keen to connect with and know more about our Aboriginal brothers and sisters, but waited to be invited. That came when we were asked to join Fellowship on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. Fellowship is an open air meeting held in a central part of the Community. A PA system pumps out Christian

praise music, and those seated around the edge of the shadow created by the spotlight are invited to get up and join in action songs. Then the Bible is read in Kriol and a short message given. Prayer concludes the time and people disperse. This was a much more fluid and interactive time compared to the Church service we were invited to join on our final Sunday in Ngukurr.

Nungalinya College before we flew out on Monday 19 June. One thing stands out: Nungalinya hosts around 300 students annually from 90 **NT Communities** representing about 100 languages. Praise God as He reconciles and unifies people in the Gospel of Jesus.





## **Happy belated Volunteers Week!**



# St Nick's Opens Refurbished Areas

St Nicholas' Anglican Church Goulburn celebrated the official opening of its new kitchen on St Nicholas' Sunday. The wardens had noticed back in 2021 that there were sections of the old kitchen floor that was giving way and suspected a structural problem. In January 2022, a team of enthusiastic St Nick's volunteers pulled out the old kitchen and looked underneath the lino. What they found was a massive problem, with nine rotted supporting beams and a water ingress problem that had caused it. Some of the beams were so wet they were like a sponge and measured a 50% water rating! This problem had been caused by outside work decades before that raised the ground outside the kitchen and caused water to flow in through the ventilation holes whenever it rained. So, the outside ground first had to be lowered and ventilation holes protected from water ingress.

"It's so easy for parish councils to do work they think is good and inadvertently cause problems for the future" said The Venerable Paul Davey. "It's always wise to check that weep holes and ventilation holes are not covered by gardens or surrounding ground works in any renovation you undertake."

The kitchen then had to be rebuilt literally from the ground up. The team persevered across most of 2022, battling a room that was not square and long Covid delays on building materials. However, the end result was a beautiful new kitchen that meets the needs of the parish for 21st century ministry. The kitchen includes two super-fast dishwashers, two sinks, handwashing station, built in bins and loads of bench space and cupboard space. It even has connections for charging smart phones built in to the design! So, on the 4th December (St Nicholas' Sunday) the Mayor of Goulburn Mulwaree Council and two councillors came to the parish and officially opened the new kitchen at morning tea (see photo where the mayor has a pink beard due to cancer research fundraising).



In addition, the new kitchen also meant a refresh of the bathrooms. The bench-tops were recycled and placed on new carcasses to provide a modern makeover to

the washing stations at both the women's and men's bathrooms. An unwanted repair problem has become what looks like a brand new ministry facility.

"The parish is super grateful to the hard-working team of volunteers who produced this outstanding infrastructure for ministry" said The Venerable Paul Davey.

"By doing much of the work themselves the volunteer team also saved the parish tens of thousands of dollars. This is now a facility that will be suited for ministry for generations to come."

**Award for Heritage -**Conservation

St Saviour's Cathedral, **Michael Fox Architects** 

St Saviour's Cathedral in Goulburn is an important Edmund Blacket building dating from 1874 with State Heritage Listing. The seemingly modest work that has been undertaken belies the complexity, restraint, important stewardship, and leadership demonstrated by the Community and their Architect. The project exemplifies the ongoing commitment required to protect and conserve important heritage items. Particularly commendable, is that this project has been driven by a local community at a grass-roots level, who simply love this building.

Beginning with a thoroughly researched and comprehensive Conservation Management Plan, the architects have brought an extremely high level of experience and skill to this project. Engaging with exceptionally specialised conservation trades, has produced high quality conservation of stonework and stained glass altogether a vastly specialised knowledge base within the accumulated team.

This project is truly an ongoing labour of love, and the jury were impressed by the commitment shown to date.


On the 29th of June, I attended the third of the dinners for clergy spouses at Bishop Mark and Monica Short's home. We numbered 20 including some clergy who were invited.


Monica also gave a talk assuring us that we are never alone. God is always with us.

# **Family Violence in Church Settings**

> **Mans Behaviour Change Programs**

On Saturday 3rd June, the Ministry Wives Network (Canberra) organized a talk and workshop on how to respond to family violence in our church context. In recent years there has been a greater awareness of the issues of family violence and its prevalence in society. Sadly, many families within our church communities may be affected, but it is not always obvious and helping victims escape abusive environments is not simple.

Women are commonly the victims of family violence, which can take many forms. Often women feel safer divulging information with women, which means that it is important that women, married to the church minister, have some understanding of how to respond to situations where it appears that a woman may be experiencing some form of abuse.

In Ruth Holt's talk, we learned that family violence is not just referring to physical violence, but a whole host of controlling behaviours that are abusive. Just because someone has no bruises does not mean that they are not being abused.

Helping to care for someone in an abusive situation is not always immediate, it may take months or years of conversations and listening to help someone recognise that they need help. One needs to be careful that the victim feels that they have agency over the whole process. It is helpful to refer to a number of organisations for advice and help.

Ruth encouraged us to educate ourselves about family violence so that we can be agents of change in the lives of those affected.

## Review

## Church Matters: essays and addresses on ecclesial belonging, Scott Cowdell (Melbourne: Coventry Press, 2022).

This selection of essays and addresses by Australian conflict avoidance, 'fawning sycophancy' and indifference Anglican priest and theologian, Canon Professor Scott Cowdell, breathes a freshness, creativity, analytical power and prophetic voice for the contemporary church. Most of the 15 chapters in this book have been previously published in books, journals or online over a 25-year period. The earlier writing prescient and arresting now as then; the latter work evidencing Cowdell's matured and formidable intellect applied to current concerns. With an overarching theme of ecclesial belonging the chapters traverse a range of ecclesial and missional concerns of the church. For example, chapters on the postmodern church, lay vocation and worship, the Holy Spirit and mission, sacramental life ('Baptismal ecclesiology and its enemies' and 'The Eucharist Makes the Church') give testimony to what Cowdell refers to as his 'stubborn confidence that God is still at work in the Church and that despair is unrealistic'.

The basis for Cowdell's confidence is unfolded in an important chapter 'On Loving the Church' in which he argues for a pneumatology of hope. Such hope is not a recipe for escapist despair but rather is born of a hardnosed reality check flagged over half a century before by Dietrich Bonhoeffer in *Life Together*: 'He who loves his dream of a community more than the Christian community itself becomes a destroyer of the latter, even though his personal intentions may be ever so honest and earnest and sacrificial'. Cowdell locates his confidence in a 'spirituality of disciplined abiding, contemplatively tuned to the active presence of God'. From this place the Church (chapter 14) can engage with contemporary society and culture mindful that 'the secularising impulse is a biblical one, a prophetic one' disarming the traditional tribal deities and opening new possibilities for faith and hope.

This basic theological and spiritual disposition filters through Cowdell's discussion of the parish, 'Two Cheers for the Parish' - not three!; 'Catholic Anglicanism for Evangelicals'; and 'Mimesis and Ministry'. This lastnamed chapter is an illuminating and in parts disturbing examination of the dynamics of Christian ministry and the role of clergy. Cowdell brings his seasoned intellectual engagement with the work of the French anthropologist René Girard to bear on the way Christian leaders so easily succumb to rivalrous behaviour, inability to collaborate,

in the face of bullying laity and superiors. How then might clergy learn to inhabit the institutional church? Cowdell, following James Alison, refers to three ecclesial virtues; hilarity, pathos and irony. This chapter ought to be required reading for all church leaders and clergy.

Cowdell's discussion of an abusive church culture (chapter 6) is worthy of not only careful reading but wide discussion in the church. Whilst recognising the serious nature of sexual abuse in the church and the suffering of victims and survivors Cowdell offers an insight into the dynamics of dysfunctional cultures, the default to scapegoating and the blindness that infects church leadership. He exposes the inflation and expansion of disciplinary codes as applied to clergy for issues of misconduct quite unrelated to matters of sexual abuse. He offers an incisive discussion of the nexus between unhealthy and immature approaches to relationships and authority in the church with 'a widespread, harmful image of God' as punisher. His conclusion rings true: 'Clergy who abuse and victimise others emerge not from a vacuum but from the Church's culture. Only by attending to that culture, and the spiritual distortions that it accommodates, can we cut the nerve of victimisation and abuse'.

The final and most recent writing 'Theology in the School of Humility' strikes a decidedly autobiographical note. Over the course of his internationally recognised theological career Cowdell has sought to hold two fundamental concerns together; the imperative 'to remain open to the real world while being continually formed in the Christian narrative'. For Cowdell this is the joint calling of theology. The deeper the immersion into this double calling the more deeply one is drawn into the life of God and the kenosis at the heart of all genuine knowing and acting in the world.

Cowdell's Church Matters, offers the reader a feast of rich theological and practical engagement with some fundamental issues for the church, theology and society. I came away with a renewed energy for, and clearer sense of what is required of the People of the Way.
